* Teaching Review and Feedback Mechanism

The IQAC successfully put in place a feedback mechanism from the students through Google forms to ensure improved teaching methods and better learning outcomes. All departments were further advised to follow a periodic review method to ensure a more effective learning exercise.

* Cleanliness and Green Practices

The IQAC strives to ensure an active cleanliness and environment consciousness in the college. Several initiatives are undertaken to ensure not only a clean campus but also spreading awareness in the neighbouring localities. Several ideas were circulated to avoid paper wastage, to recycle more, to move from disposables to eco-friendly material in cafeteria. While a cent per cent execution of these ideas could not take place there is a robust concern in the entire college community about environment due to many discussions around this effort.

* Mental and Physical Health

Acknowledging the importance of overall health periodic health camps are organised in the college to give students and teachers access to basic health check-ups. This is over and above the visiting doctor and nurse who are available in the college infirmary to address any medical issues.

* Community Work

The IQAC encourages both the student and teacher body to participate in community work. Besides an active NSS that undertakes various activities throughout the year, Enactus, a separate student body works independently and in consonance with other organisations as well to contribute to the community in many ways. The faculty is also encouraged to write on several social and public issues.

The IQAC understands the importance of an inclusive environment and the need to address special needs of students and staff. To create sensitivity towards special needs, the college has taken various initiatives to help the disabled. The Modules of Management Information System used by the College is given below:

- **Tally ERP-9**: The College is using tally EPR-9 to perform the financial analysis and financial management. It helps us in maintaining simple classification of accounts, Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account, Receipts and Payments Account, General Ledger, Bank Reconciliation etc. It provides information around receivables, turnovers, cash flow statement, activity consolidation and even college accounting. With tally integration, we store all the college accounting data securely in tally server.
- ❖ <u>Salary Package</u>: The College is using salary package for calculating the salary in respect of teaching and the non-teaching staff of the college and provide them with their pays timely. We also prepare pension in respect of pensioners of the College from this package.
- ❖ General Provident Fund Package: This package of General Provident Fund helps us to maintain the Provident Fund of each and every employee of the college. It also provides the facility to keep a regular check on the balances of the Provident Fund with complete ledger of the employees.
- **Compu Tax**: The College is using Compu Tax package for depositing TDS salary and Non-salary return of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th quarter to Income Tax Department.
- ❖ Students Attendance Module: The College is also having a student's attendance module that the faculty members of the college use to upload the monthly attendance records of each and every student. This module also provides the overall percentage of the attendance of the student at the end of every semester that helps the teachers to give them attendance marks accordingly.
- ❖ Online Admission Module: The College is using online admission module provided by Delhi University for conducting the admission in respect of 1st year students of the college.
- ❖ Online Fee Module: The College is using online fee module provided by Delhi University for collecting online fee in respect of 1st Year, 2nd Year and 3rd Year students of the College.
- ❖ <u>Public Financial Management System (PFMS)</u>: It facilitates sound public financial management system for government by establishing efficient fund flow statement as well as a payment cum accounting network. It also support reports real time expenditure at all levels. It also promotes transparency in the overall management system.
- ❖ Government eMarket Place (GEM): It provides us with the facility to purchase all basic things from GEM portal of Govt. of India. It helps us to compare various vendors selling their goods/services and gives us an opportunity to choose among the best vendors at reasonable prices and quality of product. The college has initiated the process of procurement through GeM.

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well-planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

As a constituent college of Delhi University we follow the academic calendar announced by the University and the curriculum designed by it. However the institution takes several measures to ensure well planned and timely delivery of the curriculum. The workload and time table committees work meticulously to make available the requisite number of teachers, teaching rooms, tutorial rooms to ensure smooth conduct of classes and tutorials. All department Teachers-in-charge conduct departmental meetings and consultations before the beginning of the teaching semester to distribute the workload according to faculty areas of specialization to secure implementation of curriculum objectives. The time tables of all departments and individual teachers are uploaded on the website timely. Further, the academic and cultural calendar of the institution is declared at the beginning of the session to allow for a careful planning of curricular and extra-curricular initiatives to further facilitate an unhindered and inclusive dissemination of knowledge throughout the semester.

The faculty plans its lectures to suit the requirements of the class and course objective choosing the appropriate pace and teaching methods. Classroom teaching is supplemented with assignments, class presentations, projects, group discussions spread out through the semester. Regular uploading of attendance on the college website along with all details of activities conducted in the college is the method of documentation of efficacious curricular objective implementation.

Another crucial aspect of ensuring curriculum objectives delivery is an effective feedback mechanism. The institution adopts a student centric approach in all its aspects. Students are participants in many departmental council apart from an elected students' union and offer necessary inputs through both formal and informal channels to sustain a positive teaching-learning environment. Any changes, if necessary, are adopted by the faculty and college administration to bridge the knowledge gap, if any.

1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analysed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

In order to ensure constant growth of the institution and progress of the students we have put an effective feedback mechanism in place that collects, analyses and implements suggestions from the students to make academic, infrastructural and policy improvements in the college. The feedback is collected from the students in a Google form in a standardised format. The feedback is solicited in academic and non-academic areas. Over the last academic session, on the basis of the feedback received from the students, we have installed an RO water purifying plant in the college to provide 24x7 clean and safe drinking water to the students. This step was taken as an improvement over the water dispensers and coolers installed earlier in the college. A Public Address System has been installed in the college to make collective communication possible for the smooth functioning of all community activities in college and facilitate the administrative staff to disseminate necessary information faster and more efficiently. The college has also made many infrastructural improvements to provide bigger, better equipped classrooms to the students and fulfil all necessary requirements of space.

2.3.2 Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

At Maitreyi we believe that the students do not learn only within the confines of the classroom. That a teacher's role extends to ensuring holistic growth and a healthy personality. In order to attain this, in the year 2016-17, we put in place a mentoring system wherein every teacher was assigned 50 students as mentees. These students were provided the contact number and contact hours of the teacher and they could approach her for any form of help, mentoring or counselling. However, we observed that an informal system of mentoring worked more effectively which was then adopted in 2017-18. Students were more comfortable raising concerns with teachers they knew closely and trusted implicitly. We have therefore allowed a more unofficial system of mentoring to flourish since. The teachers are advised to be approachable and aware. Any sudden changes in class performances and behaviour are taken up and addressed personally. Young girls are offered counselling session on career progression, future prospects, application to foreign universities and scholarships etc. Many of our staff members also offer financial help to students unofficially by purchasing textbooks for them. Students connect with their teachers like a family and seek guidance from them on their emotional and psychological issues. Owing to the nature of these issues formal documentation is not maintained. Academic mentorship on curriculum and career guidance takes place in the ratio 1:20. Research projects undertaken by students have a mentorship ratio of 1:2.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Following the University directive for division of marks for end term evaluation and internal evaluation, we keep 25% weightage for internal evaluation for every paper. The evaluation is based on marks in attendance, class test and projects (surveys, group discussions, empirical data analysis, paper writing and presentations). The class tests are conducted multiple times and in various format (MCQs, viva, comprehension) to ensure best student learning outcomes and identify focus areas for every student. This method also allows for students to be able to take the test in case they miss it due to medical reasons and participation in co-curricular activities outside college. This method ensures commitment of teachers and students as well as close and constant assessment of the students.

2.5.3 Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

As a constituent college of the University of Delhi, we follow the academic calendar and semester end examination schedule as declared by the university. In addition, we declare the institutional calendar at the beginning of the academic year which is in consonance with the University academic and examination calendar but also mentions the major institutional events and programs to be carried out during the year. This is to ensure smooth conduct of classes and other activities while ensuring timely delivery of curriculum and avoiding any overlaps or conflicts with the University calendar. The college follows the university regulations in constituting all necessary staff council committees and other statutory bodies that oversee the maintenance and utilization of all resources. These committees oversee the maintenance of college infrastructure, equipment and facilities.

- The college runs an NCWEB, SOL and CEC centres in its premises to allow optimum use of
 the college infrastructure throughout the year. The College also caters to National Level
 competitive exams namely CSIR-NET exam, UGC-NET exam. A faculty superintendent
 along with a team of faculty members and administrative staff are involved with the running
 of these centres.
- 2. The college has a building committee that oversees the maintenance of the college infrastructures. Through meetings conducted throughout the year necessary requisitions are considered, followed up and proposed to the Governing Body for sanctions of funds. All purchases are made and the infrastructural needs met.
- 3. There are Annual maintenance contracts for the maintenance of computers, electronics, and laboratory equipment in the college.
- 4. The college owns a Public Address System, CCTV cameras, and an RO water plant for the safety, comfort, and effective communication with the students. Each of this is maintained through an annual maintenance contract which is finalized basis the tenders that are announced online as per the norms of Government of India.
- 5. The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled, the maintenance of which is done by DU Computer centre.
- 6. The college library is a member of DELNET and INFLIBNET on annual subscription basis. This membership entitles faculty and students to access 3crore book titles and 6000 e-journals. The library has 37 computers and 8 printers which are maintained through annual maintenance contract at college level.
- 7. The institution further has annual contracts with the Photocopy shop, Canteen, Bookshop and the Mother Dairy. The services are reviewed every year by the duly constituted committees and the contracts renewed if all expectations are met.
- 8. We also maintain an annual Pest Control contract for the entire building.
- 9. The Sports equipment is purchased and maintained by the sports Committee that acquires all requisite services, material and equipment. A stock maintenance is undertaken annually by the Sport Committee to check any lack or wear and tear in equipment and requirements for replacement.
- 10. The Sports Grounds are maintained by the Physical Education department and Sports Committee and paid for through the sports Fund.
- 11. The college also caters to services such as AADHAR Card, Polling station for Elections in its premises to make optimum use of the college infrastructure.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

Curriculum Development

As a constituent college of university of Delhi the college follows the Curriculum, Academic calendar and examination schedules as announced by the University. We follow the choice based credit system and to better learning outcomes all departments carefully select the General elective and Skill Enhancement Course papers to be offered to students according to specific needs and relevance to the Students interests. The Discipline specific elective are also selected carefully often through a consultative process with the students. Several faculty members are a part of Boards of Studies/Committee of curses and Studies of Delhi University and periodically send feedback on the curriculum. They are further encouraged to attend and participate in workshops and seminars organised by Delhi University, Institute of Life Long Learning for discussions on curriculum modifications. While distributing the workload teaching lessons are assigned keeping the teachers specialisation in mind. Teaching plans are further made to assist in smooth delivery of curricular requirements.

Teaching and Learning

At Maitreyi, it is believed that teaching and learning outcomes can be achieved or improved only by realizing teacher-learner equilibrium. This makes classrooms more democratic, stimulating and lively space for ready exchange and creation of ideas and knowledge.

Teacher centric methods

We strive at providing to our teachers an enabling environment to develop innovating teaching

methodologies and constantly upgrade their skills through several activities. An ICT enabled infrastructure, Wi-Fi enabled campus allows them makes use of non traditional teaching methods. Other than encouraging participation in seminars and workshops the IQAC has encouraged faculty to take excursions, field work to make their teaching process more holistic and also turn it experiential and participative. The teachers are also advised to act as mentors and address any issues faced by the students. The IQAC assists the teachers in procuring funds from different government and non-government agencies for their research and career advancement activities. The active staff council committees allow the teachers to mentor students outside of classrooms through different extra-curricular activities, supervising students as they develop organising and leadership skills while teachers themselves get an opportunity to essay their creative ideas.

Student Centric method

The students find in Maitreyi a wholesome learning environment within and outside classrooms. The classroom space uses interdisciplinary methods, technology, and streamlined assessment and feedback system to ensure smooth delivery of the syllabus. Periodic assessment and feedback allow for special attention to vulnerable students as and when needed. Introduction of projects and presentations also inculcate learning habits among students as they attempt nascent research ideas from the first year of their program. Outside the syllabi structured teaching the students have access to a well-equipped library with a DELNET subscription and access to an immense online database. Frequent interaction with scientists, subject experts, entrepreneurs, industry professional add to the necessary guidance and mentoring that they need to develop employability and life skills. Participation in various cultural societies forms a very significant learning experience for students and leads to their holistic growth.

***** Examination and Evaluation

The semester end examinations are conducted as per university rules. The internal assessment is carried out in the college adopting the following procedures-

Discussion on the submitted and evaluated assignment in the classroom and on one to one basis if required

Based on the University directive, 25percent weightage is allotted to internal evaluation for every paper. The evaluation is based on marks in attendance, class test and projects surveys, group discussions, empirical data analysis, paper writing and presentations. The class tests are conducted multiple times and in various format MCQs, viva, comprehension to ensure best student learning outcomes and identify focus areas for every student. This method also allows for students to be able to take the test in case they miss it due to medical reasons and participation in co curricular activities outside college. This method ensures commitment of teachers and students as well as close and constant assessment of the students.

* Research and Development

The college and the IQAC is attempting to conduct workshops to inform the faculty of various possible funding for research projects. All faculty members are encouraged to research, publish and present papers. Research findings are regularly shared by the faculty though STAR bulletin. The members of the faculty who hold a Ph.D are encouraged to guide younger Ph.D scholars. The college provides requisite infrastructure, environment, study leaves to augment the research output of the faculty. We are also determined to increase research based activities among students. Often

students are attached with teachers working on research projects. The college has started student run research projects funded by the college.

❖ Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The Library has a good collection of books and every year new books are added with an objective to promote interdisciplinary approach. Such books are beyond the syllabi and enlighten students on the latest developments in modern fields. The library subscribes to e-resources 6,000 plus E-journals and e-books through N-LIST and INFLIBNET. The Library at Maitreyi Library has created its own Institutional Repository using Dspace software. Presently, the repository is provided on intranet and contains information on CBCS syllabus for all existing courses, old syllabi and end semester DU question papers. The process of digitization of college magazines, annual reports and faculty publications to be stored in the repository is also in progress.

Library is automated and taken the membership of Developing Library Network DELNET.

Office is partially computerized.

Internet access and e- library facility given in the library for users. Medical room is enabled to provide first aid kit

Canteen facility with healthy eatables is available

Utilisation of Infrastructure is optimised by conduct of SOL and NCWEB Noteworthy improvement of infrastructure and instrumentation facilities.

Human Resource Management

Administrative, Technical and non-technical staff is enthused to upgrade their educational qualifications and technical skills. Following measures are taken for achieving the same-

Staff members attend training courses like orientation, refresher.

Procurement and subsequent training for use of new software of administrative staff.

Faculty is encouraged to undertake various Faculty development programs, Workshops/Seminars/Conferences regularly. Various leaves are granted for the purpose

Study leave is granted to the faculty members for pursuing doctoral research. Performance appraisal of staff members is done regularly.

Incentives to the staff through various welfare schemes

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Industrial Visits are organized for students to get practical exposure.

Industry Experts are invited to share their views and expertise with the students. Placement cell ensures effective collaboration with corporate units and industry. Collaboration with industries and other noted institutions to organize seminars, workshops.

Admission of Students

Admission Committee is constituted with members from every department. The Committee strictly abides to the admission process formalized by University of Delhi.

Student are aptly counselled for choice of subjects at the time of admission.

Planning and Development

The College uses its e database and information systems to ensure a data driven approach to decision making. ❖ Administration

Database and records are maintained in electronic form to streamline the administrative work. Notices and other correspondence pertaining to administration are communicated through electronic channels to respective stakeholders. Notices of appointment of adhoc and guest teachers are uploaded on college website. Statutory information, student related information and other important forms are uploaded on the College website. Further, to ensure convenience of students, the administration promptly responds to email communication sent by students, parents and other stakeholders. Tender notices on all major purchases are uploaded on college website.

Finance and Accounts

To ensure availability of data and long-term storage of records, the accounts department is ensuring digitisation of its records. Further, e-compliance to regulatory authorities is done on a timely basis as and when required.

Student Admission and Support

The admission process in the College is administered and regulated by the University of Delhi. To augment the online admission process of the University, the College has taken several initiatives to improve the timeliness and spread of information dissemination required for greater convenience in the process. The guidelines, bulletins and all relevant information for the applicants are uploaded on the College website. Soft copy College prospectus is also uploaded on the webpage. The contact details of the nodal officers for admission process and the Admission Grievance Committee were also widely publicised. Any query regarding the admission process was appropriately and timely responded to by the nodal officers for admission.

6.5.4 Post Accreditation initiative(s) (mention at least three)

The college believes that enough options and opportunities should be available to all stake holders for their holistic development and therefore number of initiatives was started in 2017-18. These are as follows-

- 1. In continuation of the research initiatives undertaken by the science departments with the help of grants received from DBT under the Star College status, The Research and Incubation centre was established to promote research climate in all streams- Sciences, Social Sciences, Commerce and Languages. In 2017-18, 24 projects were undertaken by the centre under the mentorship of 48 teachers. These projects were provided financial support from the college and played a strong role in professional grooming of students. The teachers also gained experience from mentoring and guiding research projects.
- 2. In order to provide a safe, congenial environment with a good communication network for the 4000 students and staff, the college installed RO plant, CCTV and a public address system. These initiatives helped in improving basic infrastructure available in the college premises.
- 3. The college undertook many initiatives to promote healthy environment since the importance of health cannot be overlooked in current times. The sports department organised a 3 day long inter-college sports carnival and meet, Aagaz, a first of its kind at this level. As a precursor to the event, competitions were held within the college where students, teachers and support staff participated. The enthusiasm continues to grow and now regular sport practices sessions and friendly matches amongst members of teaching, non-teaching staff, and students are regularly held after college hours and during lunch break.

The importance of not just personal health but public health is critically emphasised as the

college believes that a healthy body, a healthy mind and a healthy society should coexist. An interactive session by Dr. Sue Desmond Hellmann, global CEO of Bill and Melinda Gates foundation was organised in the college, her first such interaction in India, where students learnt the critical role of women in health care provision.

7.1.2 Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability/Alternate Energy initiatives such as: Percentage of power requirement of the College met by the renewable energy sources

In spite of the extremely rocky areas in and around the campus, the college has been successful in converting it into beautiful lawns and gardens which apart from being aesthetically beautiful also acts as the carbon sink for the campus.

Plantation drives have been an annual feature of our college. Saplings are procured from Delhi government organization and are planted in the college campus.

Steps for Energy conservation:

- 1. The architecture of the college building and class rooms are such that all the rooms are well lit and there is no need for lights in the daytime.
- 2. The classrooms and labs of the college are well ventilated. Therefore, we save energy required on the air conditioning of the rooms.
- 3. The college is having a large open auditorium (amphitheatre) which is used for organizing most of the functions throughout the year, with minimum usage of electricity.
- 4. The college is using LED tube lights in most of its areas and thus ensuring conservation of electricity.
- 5. The various performing societies of the college are encouraged to use open amphitheatre for their practice sessions instead of classrooms to minimize the power usage.
- 6. The Newly constructed Science Block and Girls Hostel have been built on the basis of Green building plan. Use of recycled bricks, provision for solar panels on roof tops and rain water harvesting system are some of the important measures.

Maitreyi College stands out in its distinctive endeavours towards intensive research based learning and attempts to integrate the same with pragmatic applications. Our institution strongly believes in a deep commitment to research attitudes and scientific enquiry which also allows it to stand out among the many institutions of higher education who shoulder the collective responsibility of enabling and channelizing the young educating minds towards constructive enablement through research and innovation.

Recipient of the Star College Award, Maitreyi College has received grants for 9 consecutive years from DBT to upgrade infrastructure and promote scientific research. As a landmark achievement in 2017-18, the college has started its own research wing in Social Sciences- Sciences and Languages. As many as 24 projects have been successfully completed under the Summer Internship Programme that were undertaken and conducted by students under the mentorship and guidance of faculty members.

The keenness of thrust towards research also extends to several publications that have been undertaken by our distinguished faculty in various publishing forums of repute. The year 2017-18 credits the college with 4 books, 22 published articles in UGC approved journals, 27 chapters in edited books, 4 conference proceedings and 17 e-chapters that have been written under UDAAN, the project launched by CBSE and e-Pathshalla.

As an attempt to enhance social and individual quality of life and to integrate acquired and applied knowledge, two projects were undertaken during the year 2017-18 by the students of Zoology Hons. One of them focused on the key issue Post-menopausal symptoms and their management and the other provided awareness on Lactation- practice and attitude of women in Delhi-NCR. Similar projects and awareness initiatives were carried out by other departments of the college.

Maitreyi College aims to continue its distinctive endeavours in this direction to achieve excellence in research and its applications in diverse fields of relevance and social utility.
