System used by the College is given below: (a) Tally ERP9: The College is using tally EPR9 to perform the financial analysis and financial management. It helps us in maintaining simple classification of accounts, Balance Sheet, Income Expenditure Account, Receipts and Payments Account, General Ledger, Bank Reconciliation etc. It provides information around receivables, turnovers, cash flow statement, activity consolidation and even College accounting. With tally integration, we store all the college accounting data securely in tally server. (b) Salary Package: The College is using salary package for calculating the salary in respect of teaching and the nonteaching staff of the College and provide them with their salary timely. We also prepare pension in

respect of pensioners of the College from this package. (c) General Provident Fund Package: This package of General Provident Fund helps us to maintain the Provident Fund of each and every employee of the college. It also provides the facility to keep a regular check on the balance of the Provident Fund with complete ledger of the employees. (d) Compu Tax: The College is using Compu Tax package for depositing TDS salary and Nonsalary return of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th quarter to Income Tax Department. (e) Students Attendance Module: The College also has a students' attendance module that the faculty members of the College use to upload the monthly attendance records of each and every student. This module also provides the overall percentage of the attendance of the student at the end of every semester that helps the teachers to give them attendance marks accordingly. (f) Online Admission Module: The College is using online admission module provided by Delhi University for conducting admissions. (g) Online Fee Module: The College is using online fee module provided by Delhi University for collecting online fee in respect of 1st Year, 2nd Year and 3rd Year students of the College. (h) Public Financial Management System (PFMS): PFMS is used to facilitate sound public financial management system by establishing efficient fund flow statement as well as a payment cum accounting network. It also supports report generation in real time expenditure at all levels. It also promotes transparency in the overall management system. (i) Eprocurement for eTendering: Procurement is done through etendering. This helps us to compare various vendors for etendering work and gives us an opportunity to choose among the best vendors at reasonable price and good quality of product. (j) Government eMarket Place (GEM): It provides us with the facility to purchase from GEM portal of Govt. of India. It helps us to compare various vendors selling their goods/services and gives us an opportunity to choose amongst the best vendors at reasonable prices and the best quality of product.

## **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

#### 1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

It is our continuous endeavour to create a pleasant and friendly classroom environment for students. Well planned and regular lectures are conducted as per the university norms. Lectures involve various pedagogical methods like chalk and board, PPT's, lectures by topic experts, quizzes, making and analyzing case studies, experiential learning, field-trips etc. For certain humanities course subjects like History, heritage walks and screening of documentaries and movies are also conducted to supplement classroom teaching. In the beginning of each semester the structure of the paper to be taught, objective of paper, topics to be covered, text/ reference books, internet sources (web links, e-books) to be used are discussed with the students. Teachers prepare 'Lesson Plans' for all the topics that would be taught by them in a semester that helps them adopt appropriate pace and learning methods while maintaining a balance between university prescribed timeline and understanding capabilities of the class. This ensures that the planned pace of curriculum is maintained. Extra lectures are taken to compensate for any classes missed due to holidays, college activities, fest, etc. For better understanding of the subject, real life examples, scientific data and case studies are discussed. The learning outcome based framework is used in plethora of inter and intra department internship projects that are taken up by students during the two month long semester break period. This helps them bring about learning from the lectures i.e. theoretical formulations into practical outcomes. As made mandatory by university guidelines, continuous internal assessment is done at regular intervals at least twice in each semester by way of class tests, presentations and assignments. In addition to regular classes, revision classes, workshops, educational trips and self-explanatory notes are provided to students whenever required. A record of lectures is documented in attendance registers with dates and students attending each lecture. The attendance record is uploaded on the college website every month by individual teachers.

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#### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

At Maitreyi we believe that students don't learn only within the confines of classroom and a teacher's role extends to ensuring holistic growth and a healthy personality. Earlier, in the year 2016-17 a mentoring system was put in place wherein every teacher was assigned 50 students as mentees. These students were provided with the contact number and contact hours of the teacher and they could approach him/her for any form of help,

mentoring or counseling. However, we observed that an informal system of mentoring worked more effectively which was then adopted in 2017-18. Students were then more comfortable raising concerns with teachers they know closely and trusted implicitly. Hence the same system of mentoring was further adopted for year 2018-19. We have therefore allowed a more unofficial system of mentoring to flourish since. The teachers are advised to be approachable and aware. Any sudden change in class performance and behaviour are taken up and addressed personally. Young girls are offered counseling session on career progression, future prospects, application to foreign universities and scholarships etc. Many of our staff members also offer financial help to students unofficially by purchasing textbooks for them. Students connect with their teachers like a family and also seek guidance from them on their emotional and psychological issues. Owing to the nature of these issues formal documentation is not maintained. Academic mentorship on curriculum and career guidance takes place in the ratio of 1:20. To encourage them towards research related activities students are mentored by college faculty members during the summer internship programmes. Research projects undertaken by students have a mentorship ratio of 1:20. As we believe practical learning is more effective than theoretical learning, so college provides support system to students in organizing various events and activities. Departmental fests are solely managed by students. Various seminars and conferences are also organized in the college premises to excel the creative, communication, negotiation and learning skills of students which prepare the students for future endeavours undertaken by them. To provide them emotional and motivational support, seminars by various dignitaries including doctors and psychologists are also held. College has also appointed a counselor who visits the college regularly. Maitreyi College has an alumni association which organizes alumni meet every year. The alumni also mentor our undergraduate students and share their experiences with them.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Following the University directive for division of marks for end term evaluation and internal evaluation, 25 percent weightage for internal evaluation is there for every paper. This evaluation is based on marks for attendance, class tests, project surveys, group discussions, empirical data analysis, paper writing and presentations. The class tests are conducted multiple times and in various formats like MCQs, Viva, comprehensions to ensure best student learning outcomes and identify focus areas for every student. At least two class tests and one assignment are taken in each semester to monitor the academic understanding and growth of the students. This method allows students to be able to take the test in case they miss it due to medical reasons and participation in co-curricular activities outside college. The tests/ assignments are time bound and may be oral or written depending on the requirement of the paper for a department. Students are encouraged to give presentations on latest topics in their concerned paper so that they are well informed about latest trends in that area. Academic calendar of the college is also prepared for the semester and is adhered to for class tests/ assignments schedule. These measures ensure commitment of teachers and students as well as constant and timely assessment of all courses of the college. Due credit is also given to attendance of the students in the class room and practical labs. Based on their academic performance, supplementary classes are also held for weak students. Departments also organize literature related competitions and group discussions to evaluate their students. Presentations, open book tests, MCQs and survey based projects are also a part of continuous evaluation.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

As a constituent college of the University of Delhi, we follow the academic calendar and semester end examination schedule as declared by the university. In addition, we declare the institutional calendar at the beginning of the academic year which is in consonance with the university academic and examination calendar but also mentions the major institutional events and programs to be carried out during the year. This ensures smooth conduct of classes and other activities along with timely delivery of curriculum and avoids any overlaps or conflicts with the university calendar. This calendar is provided to all new students with the college prospectus. The college follows the university regulations in constituting all necessary staff council committees and other statutory bodies that oversee the maintenance and utilization of infrastructure, equipment, facilities and other resources. (a) The college has a building committee that oversees the maintenance of the college infrastructure. Through meetings conducted throughout the year, necessary requisitions are considered, followed up and proposed to the Governing Body for sanctions of funds. All purchases are made and the infrastructural needs met. (b) There are annual contracts for photocopy shop, canteen and bookshop for providing these facilities at subsidised rates for all stakeholders. (c) Pest control for the entire building, time to time refilling of fire extinguishers and maintenance of computers is done through Annual Maintenance Contracts. (d) All the above services are reviewed every year by duly constituted committees and contracts renewed if all expectations are met. (e) The health and hygiene committee along with the support staff (members of housekeeping) of the college is responsible for maintenance of clean and healthy environment. (f) The college campus is WiFi enabled, the maintenance of which is done by Delhi University Computer centre. (g) The college owns a Public Address System for effective communication with students. It is also equipped with CCTV cameras and an RO water plant which ensure overall safety and comfort of each individual. (h) The college library is a member of DELNET and INFLIBNET on annual subscription basis. This membership entitles faculty and students to access 3 crore book titles and 6000 ejournals. The library has 37 computers and 8 printers. (i) The college medical room provides basic medicines and has first-aid facilities. A doctor visits the college on appointed days. One qualified nurse is available on all working days

from 9 am to 3 pm. A counsellor has been appointed for students and faculty, who is available once a week for two hours in the college. (j) The Sports Ground is maintained by the Department of Physical Education and Sports Committee for which the expenses are paid through sports fund. (k) The Sports equipment is purchased and maintained by the sports Committee that acquires all requisite services, material and equipment. A stock maintenance is undertaken annually by the Sport Committee to check any lack or wear and tear in equipment including requirements for replacement. (1) The time table committee looks after apt utilization of classrooms. (m) The college runs an NCWEB, SOL and CEC centres in its premises to allow optimum use of college infrastructure throughout the year. The College also caters to National Level competitive exams such as CSIR-NET exam, UGC-NET exam, etc. A faculty superintendent along with a team of faculty members and administrative staff are involved in the execution of these tasks. (n) The college also served as a centre for conduct of examinations for computer teachers of the blind in collaboration with The Blind Relief Association, Delhi.

At Maitreyi, we acknowledge the significance of creating a sustainable future and the urgent need for alternative energy sources and a keen environmental consciousness. We constantly strive to embed a deep sensitivity towards the planet in our students and think creating an environmentally conscious campus is also imperative to it. A few measures taken in order to make our campus proplanet and environmentally conscious are as follows: 1. Construction of fully Green Building the college has recently completed the construction of a new building which uses smart architectural planning to allow sufficient natural light inside the classroom to reduce the electricity consumption. 2. Fully functional rain water harvesting system: The building also has a rain water harvesting system that enables the college to recycle and reuse the precious resource of water and limit its water dependency on outside supply. 3. Solid waste management: The college has instituted a compost pit to manage its solid waste. The compost produced through this recycling process is used as manure for the vast gardens in the college which has made our gardens self-sustainable to a large extent. 4. Carbon Foot printing: Maitreyi is the first college to undertake a full carbon foot printing assessment to better understand and adopt/implement methods to create an environmentally conscious and sustainable campus.

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#### 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

(1) Political Science department took the initiative to collaborate with Centre for Science and Environment, (CSE), India's leading environmental NGO, headed by Sunita Narain wherein the students were taught about the benefits of ecofriendly environment. (2) Dr. Livleen Shukla (Principal Scientist, IARI PUSA, New Delhi) gave hands on training on "Fungal compositing of garden and canteen waste" on 13th March, 2019. (3) The college has further endeavoured to reduce any wastage by setting up of "compost unit" in the college to form manure for its plants. All wet waste and other compostable garbage is used for this plant. (4) Recycling of waste papers, practical files, newspaper, magazines to produce neat and clean writing pads for students and teachers. (5) The college campus has rich flora of different species (76) with many of them having air pollution scavenging potential. (6) All halogen bulbs are being replaced with LED bulbs. During the college's cultural fest Rhapsody, only LED lighting is used.

#### 7.2 - Best Practices

#### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

(1) Research Exposure to Students: At Maitreyi, we believe that a research oriented environment in the institution is most conducive to the growth of all

stakeholders. An early exposure to research activities for the student has been our aim for the past few years and we have also been able to successfully implement it through various means. We have maintained a culture that strives to ensure institutional support to the faculty to conduct research and publication activities. Many members of the staff undertook several research projects while the academic performance of students continued to improve. We came to believe that involvement of the students in research activities has a twofold effect on their performance. It offered them necessary research tools to further a critical spirit of enquiry thus deepening their understanding of the subject and improving their academic performance. In addition to this, undertaking research project gives them the required exposure to take on projects with responsibility, accountability and integrity and prepare them better for the future. Therefore, we have extended the research focus to our student as well by establishing a Research Centre in the college. We consistently create research opportunities for our students within the college where they conduct research under close mentorship of the faculty. The college offers all possible support to the students for this through the Summer Internship project, which is funded and supervised by the college. The students enjoy an opportunity to undertake research projects and present the conclusions of their research to students, teachers as well as external experts. The college also encourages this through adjudicating the best student project for each stream. (2) The Startup programs: Maiteryi has begun two innovative projects namely, Gulistan and Kriti, wherein the work of members of the college community is showcased and utilised to generate resources. Gulistan, the college's start -up, uses the plants nurtured in the college gardens (which are awarded nearly every year in the University's Garden exhibition) as token mementos to guests invited to the college for various academic and cultural purposes. Originally, the college used to purchase these potted plants but now we generate these gifts on campus. Similarly, Kriti, is the college's start up that allows art work created by the college's art society to be framed and gifted to dignitaries that are invited to the college on various occasions. The student who has created the painting is invited to present the painting to the dignitaries. This has as double fold benefit: the students' find an opportunity to showcase their talent and receive encouragement while the college has created a sustainable method of resource generation. In fact, Prof Bhushan Patwardhan, who was the Chief Guest for a national conference organised by the college, immensely appreciated these endeavours undertaken by the college and we hope to further our efforts in designing even better practices in the years to come.

#### 7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Maitreyi has long sustained its reputation as an institution with integrity and deep commitment to research and holistic growth of all its stakeholders. Inclusiveness is amongst the important ideals we try and uphold to the best of our abilities. To provide equal opportunities and enabling support to all special needs individuals and create infrastructural support for differently abled, disabled and specially abled individuals from within and outside the institution is the institutional distinctiveness of Maitreyi. We have taken several measures to create awareness, sensitivity and necessary tools to build an inclusive environment in the college. The Enabling Unit of the college organised a one-week interdisciplinary Faculty Development Programme on

"Disabilities Studies : Perspectives and Emerging Trends" in collaboration with TLC, Ramanujan College. This was the first FDP in India on the area of disability and was attended by 57 teachers from various universities. The FDP was organised as a step towards offering necessary knowledge and tools to the faculty members to better understand issues regarding disabilities to further create an environment of inclusiveness in the college and incorporate these in their teaching. The college has also collaborated with the Department of Physical Education to establish "Sashakt Nodal Sports Centre for PwDs (Persons with Disabilities). Under this initiative, wheel-bound players of national and international repute attend basketball practices in the synthetic basketball court in college premises. The college also provides student volunteers for this initiative. In the same spirit the college has collaborated with Special Olympics Bharat, Delhi to hold fitness training camp for athletes with intellectual disabilities in the college premises during the summer vacations. Maitreyi is the first college to undertake such a collaboration and to open its infrastructure to be utilized for the growth and development of specially abled athletes.

#### 8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

(1) The startup program run by college, Kriti, wherein the art work created by the students of the college art society Artisto, is utilized for gifting purpose to the dignitaries will be commercialized, and the students will be given a platform not to simply showcase their talent but also monetize their work. (2) The College further aims to undertake international collaborations in Sports, keeping in line with the Fit India agenda of the Central government. Tony Parker, ex NBA (National Baseball Academy) player (U.S.) is starting an academy in India Tony Parker Adequat Academy the college intends to start collaboration with them. (3) Since we are a women's college and wish to promote fitness, health and sports amongst girls, we wish to start a women centric Net Ball centre in collaboration with the Net ball Federation of India. Under this scheme, the college will provide the infrastructure for Net Ball Centre where all women players from anywhere in the country can practice free of charge. (4) We mean to create an inhouse social media team in the college. The College's Social Media accounts and all related promotions will be handled by students. This will give the students exposure to digital platform in a semiprofessional environment and also save resources of the college. (5) As the college prides on its research climate for students we aim to further strengthen it by making student research programs an all year round activity by calling in and providing funds for Research Projects by the students through the Research Centre which has so far been focused on Summer Internship Projects.
